Though his feast day was December 6, St. Nicholas, Patron Saint of children, schoolchildren, and sailors, occupies our minds in this month of celebration. Other sources say he is known as Nicholas the Wonderworker; they add that he is the patron saint of merchants, archers, repentant thieves, brewers, and pawnbrokers.

Not much is known about his life except that he may have been born in about 270 AD to a rich family in Asia Minor (perhaps Lycia). Even from the cradle, Nicholas showed signs that he was destined to be a saint. On fast days, he turned away from his mother's offered milk. Later, when he was an orphan, he gave away his inheritance to the poor. En route to the Holy Land, he saved the boat carrying him and others from capsizing during a storm at sea.

While he was a preacher, a heavenly voice named him the new Bishop of Myra (in Lycia), and in this role he

may have participated in the first Council of Nicaea (325) which unified the Churches.

According to legend, he gained his reputation as a protector of schoolchildren and well-behaved young people when he brought back to life two model schoolboys whom an innkeeper had cut into pieces and pickled in a tub of brine, intending to sell them as pork during a famine. This story has been passed along in a French song, "La Légende de Saint Nicholas," which relates that a butcher chopped up and salted three boys.

In France, Saint Nicholas makes his rounds as Père Noël (Father Christmas), usually accompanied by Père Fouettard, a bogeyman who punishes disobedient children with a whip he carries.

After Nicholas' death, a group of merchants rescued his major bones from a sarcophagus in Myra and brought them to his major shrine, the Basilica di San Nicola in Bari, Italy.

Whether in feast or in famine, despite pickled children, we think of St. Nicholas with love and affection year-round.






