
Dear St. Francis Family,

So much is going on in and around our parish, and it is all thanks to you! Thanks to your continued support through your time, talent, and treasure! Thanks to your continued prayers and dedication to the work of our church and your participation in this body of Christ. Our garden is nearing completion. We have just celebrated our first Drive-Thru Eucharist. We will be hosting our first Lunch-Learn with Deacon Rebecca Bean on behalf of the Episcopal Churches of Goldsboro outreach initiative. And, we are looking towards Lent, with three Ash Wednesday services (one hosted by each of our Episcopal Churches of Goldsboro) and a shared Wednesday Lenten Study focusing on a virtual Pilgrimage Through the Holy Land.

While we may still find ourselves in the midst of a global pandemic that has required us to keep our distance, the Spirit is moving with vigor throughout our parish and our community! This Spirit sparks inside of us the drive and call to find new ways to connect to one another, to engage in our community, and to be the church in a world that is more desperate than ever to know and experience the love of God and the grace of Jesus. As we look toward our Lenten season my hope is that we can take this spirit and energy, using it to fuel our shared relationship and work with the Episcopal Churches of Goldsboro. This year the three churches will gather together on Zoom each Wednesday at 7 PM to for a virtual pilgrimage through the Holy Land as we explore our faith through the history, geography, and theology that surrounds this sacred space. Each week we will "travel" to a different space of the Holy Land and to explore what the physical space means for our spiritual lives.

Also, during Lent the garden will be made available with an interactive prayer experience, so stay tuned for more information on that. And the Episcopal Churches of Goldsboro will again share our Holy Week experience as well as Easter service offerings. I look forward to our Lenten Pilgrimage together to see how the Spirit continues to spark joy and life in our parish and in our larger community.

Who lies behind the beautifully unique, creative cards we all have received from St. Francis? Most of us know Patti Donnelly is the mastermind behind this effort to celebrate our birthdays and holidays.

Patti was born in Binghamton, NY. The oldest of ten children, she graduated from Whitney Point High School and had one year at Bob Jones University. After working in flower shops for a few years, she was employed for thirty-four years as the final inspector of the black boxes General Electric makes for airplanes. She met Paul Donnelly at GE, and

during their travels to North Carolina to visit her sons, they noticed St. Francis and talked about visiting sometime, but their short holiday visits then didn't allow time for coming to a service.

Paul and she were members of a small Episcopal church, All Saints, where they were involved in many aspects of church life. From an early age, Patti had attended a Baptist church with her grandmother, and she said she has loved church from that time to this.

After Paul died in 2018, Patti moved to Goldsboro to be near her sons Larry in Rosewood and Christopher in Pikeville. A third son, Steve, lives in Idaho with his daughter, ten-year-old Madalyn. Larry has two children, Tara and Michael, and Patti has a great-granddaughter, Maelin, age eight.

Patti's hobbies include quilting, cardmaking, and cooking. She enjoys reading World War II fiction. She said a saving grace during Covid was making forty-five lap quilts to send to a nursing home in Morganton, West Virginia, where Paul's brother Phillip is Executive Director.

Patti says, "I am thankful for the talents I have that can cheer and help others." She doesn't allow arthritis in her right hand to slow her down too much, as we can tell!

Once she moved to Goldsboro, Patti satisfied her curiosity about St. Francis by attending a service. She said that Elaine Elmore at that first visit made her so welcomed and comfortable that she felt at home already. \triangleleft



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Absalom Jones

Absalom Jones is commemorated in The Episcopal Church on February 13. Jones was an African American abolitionist and clergyman and the first African American ordained a priest in The Episcopal Church. Absalom Jones was born enslaved to Abraham Wynkoop in 1746 in Delaware. Jones moved to Philadelphia after his master sold his plantation along with Absalom's mother and six siblings. Jones bought his wife Mary's freedom and later his master granted Absalom's emancipation in 1784.

In 1787, with his friend Richard Allen, they founded the Free



African Society, a mutual aid benevolent organization that was the first of its kind organized by and for black people. Bishop William White ordained Jones a deacon in 1795 and a priest on September 21, 1802. Jones faithfully served the people at the African Episcopal Church of St. Thomas in Philadelphia, a church which remains a vibrant congregation.
