We don't have much time to gladden the hearts of those who walk this way with us. So, be swift to love and make haste to be kind" (Henri-Frédéric Amiel). And may God's blessing remain with you all just as you are a blessing to all.



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Having run out of parishioners willing to be the FOCUS feature, I am following a suggestion from Patti Donnelly to write about saints. While we should begin with our own Saint Francis, I will focus instead on Dame Julian of Norwich. A chapel at Trinity Center honors her name and life, as some of us saw on a recent visit to the camp and conference center. Some of her words are inscribed on a sign outside the chapel: "And all will be well, all manner of things shall be well," words which have become a mantra for many people. So who was Julian of Norwich?

In the Middle Ages, Julian was a girl's name, but she is also known as Juliana, Dame Julian, or Mother Julian. Authorities are unsure of her birth year but estimate that she was born around 1343 and that she died after 1416.

Julian lived in the English city Norwich, a vibrant religious and commercial center. Details of her early life and education remain sparse, but in 1373 at age 30 or so, when she thought she was dying, she had a series of visions of the Passion of Christ. She wrote about these visions in *Revelations of Divine Love*, the earliest surviving book in English (Middle English) known to be written by a woman. Her book had a short form and a long form written later.

She became an anchoress or anchorite, a word from the Greek that means "to withdraw." She chose to live permanently shut up in a room called an anchorhold, 12 feet by 12 feet, sparsely furnished with three small windows called squints, attached to a church. Through one window she received meals; through another, she received the Eucharist as this window opened into the church; and through the third window she had a glimpse of the world outside.

Called the greatest English mystic of the Middle Ages, Julian wrote abut her visions, or "shewings," in *The Long Text*, consisting of 86 chapters and 63,500 words. In her theological works, she likened divine love to motherly love: God is metaphorically both our mother and out father, a theme found in other works by Biblical prophets.

She wrote: "For I saw no wrath except on man's side, and He forgives that in us, for wrath is nothing else but a perversity and an opposition to peace and to love." She wrote that God sees us as perfect and waits for the day when human souls mature so that evil and sin will no longer hinder us. "God is nearer to us than our own soul," she wrote. This theme is repeated throughout her work: "Jesus answered with these words, saying: 'All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of thing shall be well.' ... This was said so tenderly, without blame of any kind toward me or anybody else."

The Episcopal Church commemorates Dame Julian on May 8.

At a General Audience in December 2010, Pope Benedict XVI discussed the life and teaching of Julian. "Julian of Norwich understood the central message for spiritual life: God is love and it is only if one opens oneself to this love, totally and with total trust, and lets it become one's sole guide in life, that all things are transfigured, true peace and true joy found and one is able to radiate it," he said. He concluded: "And all will be well,' 'all manner of things shall be well': this is the final message that Julian of Norwich transmits to us and that I am also proposing to you today."

The Vestry and ECW are planning an Appreciation Day for Bill Hayes to celebrate his nearly 25 years at St. Francis.
