Recently I have been hearing the term "new normal" a lot. And, it has made me wonder: Is this really the new normal? Physically distancing ourselves from one another? Having to navigate public interactions with the fear of being infected, or even worse, of infecting someone else? Not knowing when we will gather as a community again? Or, when we will see one another's faces (below what has been concealed by our masks)? Or, even when we will be able to feel the embrace of our loved ones and friends? These unknowns beg the question: Is this really the new normal, or is it just the new for now?

My hope, prayer, and belief is that this is just our new reality for right now. As humans we were made for connection, so nothing about how we are living in this moment is normal, which probably accounts for why it is so difficult. In navigating this new season of our lives, I am reminded of the famous passage from Ecclesiastes 3:1: "for everything there is a season." This passage, known as wisdom literature, speaks to the ebb and flow of life. While the way we are living at this moment is far from any sense of normal we have ever known before, it is far from new. Pandemics have come and gone for as long as germs and host bodies have inhabited the earth. And, while the Coronavirus is novel to our time, history has shown us that pandemics are not, and, moreover, neither are humans' responses to them. As we begin entering the potential second wave, there is a weariness that comes with it. During the Spanish Influenza, the most severe pandemic in modern history, the second wave was the deadliest, for the mere fact that the pain of separation was too much to bear any longer. And, there is no denying that our separation is painful, and it has been long. We (or at least I) are growing weary of having to live into this new reality.

Many of us, myself included, are experiencing quarantine fatigue, growing more and more impatient and tired by this "new normal". But, as Ecclesiastes reminds us, it is just a season. It will not last forever. And, the more we live into our call to love our neighbor as ourselves, by wearing our masks, washing our hands, and keeping social distance, the sooner we can return to "normal" (whatever that may mean). I long for the day when we can share in the full communion, sing at the top of our lungs, and embrace one another. And, while that season will return, it is not yet that time, and so we will refrain from embracing (for now).

As I said earlier, humans are made for connection, so we at St. Francis will continue to find new creative and safe ways to connect to each other. This October we began hosting Outdoor Evening Prayer,

Faith & Fellowship, and even a Drive Through Pet Blessing. As we continue living into this new time, we will keep looking for ways and opportunities to connect to God and one another, so stay tuned! 


