Instead of a focus on a parishioner, a recent gift to St. Francis has made several of us focus on the Garden of St. Francis and the people it memorializes.

Tom Norwood, parishioner in the past, had the idea of a memorial garden after his wife Margaret died in 1970. Her friends had given money in her memory, and Tom wrote an account ten years later of his process in creating a place of meditation and repose that we enjoy today.

Tom had been involved in gardens in Washington, DC, and at St. Stephen's
in Goldsboro; he envisioned a site in the shape of the Episcopal church
shield, a design which required bulldozing trees and leveling the land.

He wanted eight concrete benches (which remain in place today), and he lined the walkways with 32 tons of finely ground lime rock (replaced by grass walkways in the present). His plan included a watering system and lighting with four spotlights, the fixtures for which are still in place though the lights are no longer used.

He planned for each of four quadrants to celebrate festival colors—red, white, purple (imagine blue), and green with plantings the Bible mentions, if possible. He hoped for a minimum of 25 plants in each quadrant, according to his essay.

Japanese and Korean boxwoods outline each border with native ferns and myrtle at the corners. Rhododendrons created the background with dogwood and magnolias behind them. On the cross at the head of the Garden were evergreen clematis and white wisteria.

In recent years, Sandy Siler, a master gardener, Zeb Jones, and others have tried to keep the Garden in shape, but over the years, trees have grown, and the boxwoods may have outlived their life span. Many have dried up foliage and bare spaces.

Today, the Garden needs much work, and we have a gift from an anonymous donor which may enable us to make the Garden close to Tom Norwood's vision.

It is no surprise that Ruthie Kemp, Tom's daughter, wanted her final resting place to be near the memorial to her mother and to her father's wish for a beautiful reminder of God's work in nature. We welcome Brandon Robbins to the Vestry!

Born in Goldsboro, Brandon is a graduate of Goldsboro High School (2001), the University of Mount Olive (BA English, 2005), and East Carolina University (Master's of Library Science, 2011). As Media Coordinator at Southern Wayne High School, he manages the school library and provides supplementary instruction in information literacy.



Married to Nicolle in 2012, he also has his mother Dar-

lene, his father Tony, and a brother Jacob as his immediate family members. His sister-in-law Pamela Johnson and his mother-in-law Rachel Johnson have participated with him in the Saturday Faith and Fellowship Group.

Brandon's hobbies and interests include video games, comic books, toys, reading, and creative writing.

He and Nicolle have been members at St. Francis for four years, and his goal as a vestry member is "to see our congregation grow with new members of all ages and walks of life."

We look forward to Brandon's contributions to the Vestry.


# St. Francis Holiday Cleanup Day December 12th Starts at 9:00 Rain date December 19th. We need your help!
